WHAT IS GTIB?

Created by the Georgia Legislature in 2009, the Georgia Transportation Infrastructure Bank (GTIB) is a grant and low-interest loan program administered by the State Road and Tollway Authority (SRTA).

> Since its inception, GTIB has provided \$124 million in grants and loans to highly competitive transportation projects. This investment has resulted in \$768 million in total project value.

> > GTIB invests in projects that address critical local and state transportation needs including **economic development** and **mobility**, demonstrate a high degree of **local commitment** and include **innovative solutions**.



GWINNETT PLACE COMMUNITY IMPROVEMENT DISTRICT

I-85 Diverging Diamond Interchange at Pleasant Hill Road

Year of Award: 2012 Project Completed: 2013

This project replaced the traditional diamond interchange at I-85 and Pleasant Hill with an innovative diverging diamond configuration which improved operational efficiency and capacity.

The award-winning innovative Pleasant Hill Road over I-85 diverging diamond interchange (DDI) design continues moving traffic efficiently along one of metro-Atlanta's most well-traveled corridors.

The DDI's efficiencies resulted in a 51 percent decrease in the average number of stops and a 43 percent decrease in total delay along Pleasant Hill Road. This accomplishment is having a significant positive impact for motorists traveling into the Gwinnett Place area.

GRADY COUNTY

Tired Creek Lake Roadway Improvements

Year of Award: 2014 Project Status: Underway

Upgrades ranging from pavings and widenings to the construction of bridges are being made to three roadways providing access to a newly created 960 acre recreational lake. These upgrades improve mobility and pave the way for future development in the area.

The GTIB grant has allowed us to pave the roads into the lake area, which provides the opportunity for all vehicles and people to safely travel to their relaxation spot in the woods of rural Grady County. In time we hope to see the area grow and develop with homes, shops, camping areas, a community center, and many other exciting tax base generating venues and options.

Johns Creek paved public residential roads in multiple neighborhoods, allowing the city to accelerate its transportation maintenance program.


The GTIB loan enabled the city to start a program of neighborhood resurfacing that it has continued to fund locally since 2014. Basically, the loan kickstarted the program. By receiving the loan, the city was able to repair the worst rated roads within neighborhoods before they deteriorated to a point of failure. At that point the cost would have been 2 to 3 times the resurfacing costs to repair. In addition, the city was able to bid a sizable amount of resurfacing and received better pricing because of it.



2 LANE BRASELTON PARKWAY




LEVERAGING LOCAL RESOURCES

This project will extend Braselton Parkway two miles along I-85 to Old Winder Highway incorporating two roundabouts to improve operational efficiencies. Several million dollars of private investment, as well as funds from the town and county, will be leveraged.

BUCKHEAD COMMUNITY IMPROVEMENT DISTRICT

Park Over GA 400 Concept Plan

Year of Award: 2018 Project Status: Underway

The Park Over GA 400 project will create new bike and pedestrian bridges improving access to MARTA and within the Buckhead CID core. This infrastructure will serve as access points for a newly constructed park over GA 400, the first of its kind in Georgia.

At this location in Buckhead, GA 400 and Lenox Roads have served the driving public well, providing access to and from Buckhead, but these transportation facilities have also disconnected the community, hindering east-west mobility for people who would prefer not to drive. By pursuing this project, we will not only reconnect both sides of GA 400 and humanize Lenox Road for pedestrians and cyclists, but we will also be creating a gathering place sorely lacking in this part of the city.

ELIGIBILITY

Who is eligible?

All Georgia counties, cities, community improvement districts (CIDs), state authorities, boards, commissions, agencies and departments are eligible. Two or more of these entities may also apply together.

What is eligible?

Projects must be motor fuel tax eligible. Examples include improvements to public roads and bridges and associated bike, pedestrian and traffic control infrastructure.

GTIB funds may be utilized for preliminary engineering, right of way and/or construction costs.
